33 Then Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" 34 Jesus answered, "Do you ask this on your own, or did others tell you about me?" 35 Pilate replied, "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me. What have you done?" 36 Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here." 37 Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."



[Think & Pray...]

Meditation: "Look! He is coming with the clouds; every eye will see him, even those who pierced him; and on his account all the tribes of the earth will wail. So it is to be. Amen. 'I am the Alpha and the Omega,' says the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty'." rev. 1.7-8

Reflection: An Everlasting Dominio—Eschatological themes again dominate the readings in this, the celebration of Christ the King, which also marks the end of our liturgical year. The true king shall liberate his people and reign forever.

In a recent article, freelance writer Michaela Bruzzese, calls us to be "beatitude kings" who imitate Jesus as leaders for justice and mercy. Remember, kingship, for Jesus, was the opposite of what it is considered today; it is not a hierarchy of privilege, but an upside-down kingdom of justice and mercy; a transformative love that brings new life to all. Remember, earlier in Mark, Jesus fled the crowds because they wanted to try and make him a traditional king, not a beatitude king.

Consider: Imagine, what would a conversation between Jesus and our government look like, and how do you fulfill your role as a beatitude king and priest? The path for such leaders promises to be difficult, but we can have confidence because, as Revelation tells us, Jesus is at the beginning and the end of our story.
